


















The approximate number of classes or labs that I did not attend




Relative to other courses I have taken at UVic, the workload in this course was

I have found myself frequently disappointed by the lack of sensitivity, awareness, and ability to have an open mind that Bruce have been exemplifying. The manner in which he interacts with students in the class frequently devalues their opinions, strips them of their agency, and brings his ego to the forefront of his lectures. As such it became clear that he viewed us as less than himself, alienating us from the academic experience. The way that he handles very serious issues such as mental health, body image, and sexual assault is often insensitive, and informal. By throwing in mentions of rape without warning students ahead of time he may be unknowingly be triggering someone in a way that is unhealthy both for them, and for their peer group by extension. Bruce should learn to address topics like these with more sensitivity – I am not advocating for censorship, as it is important to address these issues, but he needs to be more aware of the experiences of his students and how one could be impacted by casual and often explicit mention of sensitive topics. All of this also contributes to the attitude that he displays towards women within the class; The voices that he uses to explain female interactions is incredibly condescending, he undermines women and makes blanket statements about the entire gender. All in all, as a straight, white, cis male in a position of authority he has a responsibility to the educational community to further minority rights using his privilege and I do not believe that he is doing that, let alone teaching his students those values.

I think that the TA Could have made the marking more clear (I even went during office hours) and used the TA suggestions for the next exam but I still struggled to achieve the grade that I wanted.
The course teaches a good introduction to sociology in some ways. However, the topics are simplified to the point that they are sometimes unrecognizable when presented in upper year classes. I took Soci 281 (Sociology of Gender) at the same time as this course, which covered queer theory, a topic covered in 100A. My basis for Queer Theory from 100A provided no help, and I could not connect the knowledge from 100A with what I was learning in Soc 281, as it had been so oversimplified.
One of my main issues with the course content is in regards to the Gender section. Of the three sociologists we studied regarding women's issues and feminism, two were male. The majority of Soc100A and Soc100B both revolve around male sociologists, and female representation is extremely lacking and extremely important, particularly when studying women. I had particular concern with our study of Engel's theory on gender, which we spent the majority of that section of the course on. Engels had clearly been impacted by his male privilege, leading his conclusions to be lacking. This was barely acknowledged by Bruce, and we nonetheless studied Engels even more than the feminist critique of Engels. All and all this course is lacking in depth of content, representation of women's perspectives and female and feminist sociology.
TA's had major discrepancies between grading, this made grading somewhat unfair
The TA criteria differed from his criteria which created confusing contradictions in expectations and trying to fulfill both was difficult.
The grading standard seemed impossible to fulfill. I received an A in 100A and got an A– on the second midterm and I still felt that it was too high on midterms.
Having to reference the textbook in exam questions was annoying when it was on questions that were not covered in the textbook.
Having to simultaneously study for a midterm and work on the research intent was frustrating – due dates needed to be adjusted slightly.
More time in tutorials to engage with sociological concepts with a smaller group to build understanding/engage with material. I feel tutorials are just used (mainly) for the TAs to go over the expectations clearly listed online that could be
